
How blessed we are to be part of, and to witness to global expressions of faith!

Family Promise Host Week December 1-8



Family Promise of the Palouse is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to empower families experiencing homelessness or in danger of becoming homeless to achieve sustainable independence for a more promising future. Along with providing temporary housing and meals for up to four families in local church facilities, they also work with homeless families in our community to guide them to long-term sustainable housing. Families receive education related to financial literacy, parenting and life skills. With the support of a case-manager, families are guided to employment, health care and housing.

First Presbyterian Church and our friends from Quail Run Ward are hosting Family Promise guests again on December 1-8. Our hosting duties include preparing and taking down guest bedrooms, providing and hosting evening meals and hosting our guests overnight on Sunday, Monday, Wednesday and Saturday. Fall has been a busy time for Family Ministry, and winter and the Advent season look like they will continue this trend.

FOON took off faster than ever, with numbers surpassing 100 per week in record time. We have a good FOON team, but there's always room for more participation. This is a joyful ministry that impacts the lives of more people than anything else we do regularly in our church. It also involves many people in our congregation and beyond. We always have room for more helpers, whether you want to be involved regularly or would just like to fill in on occasion. If you have never seen what we do at FOON, pick a Wednesday and join in.

Our Youth Group meets twice a month and has a group of energetic middle and high schoolers. On November 6, the majority of the students were in the MMS Fall Concert, so instead of having our regular youth group that week, we went to see our middle school musicians perform. Participants report that our youth group is "really fun" and they "are always looking forward to it."

This fall we have been going through the Lord's Prayer with imaginative readings, exploring conversations Jesus might have had with his disciples. We feed the youth group students each meeting, so if you would like to supply the food sometime, just let me know. We will be celebrating Thanksgiving and Christmas at upcoming meetings.

We had a record-breaking Parent Night Out in October, with 21 kids attending. It was a great combination of new and returning families. The parents were free to enjoy themselves without worrying about their kids, including a group of single moms who were able to have a fun evening out together. Our November PNO is November 22 from 5:00-8:00 p.m.

Our final Parent Night Out of 2024 will be December 21 from noon to 3:00. This is a great event for people in our congregation to help out with activities at a PNO that will be finished before dark. At this meeting, the kids do a lot of crafts and have the chance to select and wrap gifts for their family members. The Parent Night Out program is a wonderful cooperative project between our congregation and the UU Church.

Lael Chapel Siding Replacement Project

Looking for end-of-year giving opportunities? Please help restore Lael's Chapel!

The chapel's original cedar siding, now 40 years old, has reached the end of its useful life. Despite efforts to maintain the siding over the years, the wood has become weathered and brittle, and flickers have moved in. The Lael Board plans to install new siding which will be more durable and resistant to weather, pests, and fire. Insulation will be upgraded, and sliding glass doors and a window will be replaced. To keep costs down, we plan to complete the work with volunteer labor in the spring – more about that as plans evolve.

Our fundraising goal is \$15,000.

To date, there is just over \$7,000 in the siding fund.


